Production at Howrah Works suffered due to considerable delay in placement of order by Railway Authority for Wagon manufacturing and supply and also due to cash flow problem as both Tripura PWD and Arunachal PWD Authorities are not releasing Company's due payment since long.

CAPITAL:

As on 31.03.2005 paid up capital of the company stands at Rs. 1397.50 Lakhs comprising 1,39,75,000 equity shares of Rs. 10/- each, of which 1,36,15,000 equity shares are held by the Holding Company, Bharat Yantra Nigam Ltd.

Consequent upon the sanction of capital restructuring scheme of the company by Government of India, the Government of India loan of Rs. 1101.22 Lakhs outstanding on 31.03.2004 have been converted into equity and shown as "Capital Suspense" pending allotment of shares. Steps have been taken to increase the authorized share capital of the company accordingly.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE:

Company has made capital expenditure of Rs. 415.87 Lakhs during the year mainly for purchase of construction equipment.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE EARNINGS AND OUTGO:

Foreign Exchange earnings of the Company during the year were Rs. 63.14 Lakh. The expenditure in foreign currency for import of raw materials etc. amounted to Rs. 147.53 Lakh as indicated in Notes Forming part of the Accounts – Schedule 8.2,(1)(d), (e) and (f).

ENERGY CONSERVATION:

Efforts to conserve energy were intensified through implementation of various measures during the last couple of years based on the energy audits conducted by external experts leading to considerable savings.

Apart from above, different measures have been taken to save energy:-

- (a) Regular person to person campaign to put off light, fan, A.C. machines, wherever possible.
- (b) Systematic periodical overhauling of all electrically operated machines.
- (c) Replacement of Halogen lamps by Metal Halide lamps.

TECHNOLOGY, R&D AND QUALITY:

In the present competitive market, the need to continuously update technology and upgrade the quality, along with R&D efforts, has been recognized by the Company as of supreme importance and the activities in these areas are being pursued with great strength. The Company with its sustained efforts has been continuing to develop new products, update technology and upgrade quality standards.

The Company has already established successful operation in the diversified areas such as: Pot and Pot-Superstructure for Aluminum Smelter, Highways and Expressways, Furnaces and Heaters, Main Boiler work in Thermal Power Station, Manufacturing of Railway Wagons, Cross-country Pipeline, Storage Silos for Alumina, etc.

The Company is now trying to diversify in other areas such as: Pumped Storage / Hydel Projects, Fire Fighting System, LPG Bullet Tank, Flyover Construction, Construction of Higher Diameter Storage Tanks (Above 79 M).

The Company has already been awarded ISO:9001-2000 with respect to Tank Construction and Manufacture of Bailey Bridge and Wagons. The Surveillance Audit has been carried out successfully by External Auditor, M/s. DNV.

In compliance with the requirements of Section 217(1)(e) of Companies Act, 1956, the particulars of Research & Development, Technology Absorption and Adaptation are appended in Schedule (Form B) forming part of this report.

HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT:

Company's philosophy on corporate governance is guided by a strong emphasis on transparency, accountability and integrity which is being practiced over the years. All employees are bound by a code of conduct which sets forth Company's policies on all important issues including it's relationship with customers and Government Agencies. This message has been drilled down to all levels of employees. Since a right mixture of what Company expects from the employees and what employees desire from the Company, is constantly formulated through interactive and participative relationship between Management and Employees has developed in all spheres of activities and a sense of belongingness amongst its employees is being developed progressively.

Training is an integral part of the Company's business strategy. As reported in past years, most of the employees have been imparted training on specified identified training needs in respective sphere of work; resultantly, skills have been improved. This year, in terms of ISO 9000-2000 norm, training identification need is being converted to competency based to develop attitude towards process development and customer oriented services.



REPRESENTATION OF SC/ST, OBC AND DISABLED PERSONS:

There is no virtual overall change in the position of representation of Scheduled cast and Scheduled Tribe, OBC and Disabled persons in the total employment strength, as reported during past years, since no fresh induction is being made over the years. Backlog position will be taken up for consideration if and when process of recruitment resumes.

PROGRESSIVE USE OF HINDI:

The Company through its Official Language Implementation Committee is constantly endeavoring to enhance awareness of employees regarding 'Progressive Use of Hindi' in official works and to fulfill various other requirements as per Government directives. OLIC meetings are held regularly to review and monitor the progress achieved in this regard. Regular Hindi classes are conducted in the Office premises for imparting Hindi training to the non-Hindi knowing employees. "Hindi Fortnight" was observed from 14th to 28th September, 2004. On this occasion various programmes / competitions etc. were conducted.

AUDIT COMMITTEE:

Keeping in view the present position of non-availability of requisite number of Non-executive (Part time Non-official) Directors on the Board of the Company, Audit Committee of the Company could not be reconstituted until Part time Non-official Directors are appointed in the board of the Company by the Administrative Ministry.

However, the Board of Directors at its 78th Meeting held on September 06, 2005 reconstituted the Audit Committee comprising Shri Manoj Kr. Singh, Part-time Official Director representing Administrative Ministry (HI&PE), Government of India, Shri Mukesh Jha, Director (Finance) and Shri Subhojit Dutta, Director (Project Management).

DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITY STATEMENT:

Biswas, Chief General Manager (Civil)-East was entrusted with the additional charge of the post of Managing Director of the Company with effect from 1st April, 2005.

Pursuant to Order No.3(8)/2002-PE-IV dated 01.04.2005 received from Ministry of Heavy Industries & Public Enterprises, Department of Heavy Industry, Government of India, New Delhi Shri Mukesh Jha was appointed as Director (Finance) of the Company with effect from 1st April, 2005.

Pursuant to Order No.3(4)/2004-PE-IV dated 12.04.2005 received from Ministry of Heavy Industries & Public Enterprises, Department of Heavy Industry, Government of India, New Delhi Shri Subhojit Dutta was appointed as Director (Project Management) of the Company with effect from 12th April, 2005.
